



FOSTERING COMMUNITY THROUGH QUALITY RETAIL EXPERIENCES



Driven by a growing demand for more satisfying community experiences, DMSAS is transforming underutilized urban cores and burgeoning suburban retail centers around the country into axes for vibrant community life. It's an enduring exercise of the power of thoughtful master planning and architectural design to deliver a destination experience that features walkable environments, inviting streetscapes, human-scaled buildings, and genuine centers for commerce and community gathering.

We're seeing the success of our approach in Fort Worth's Sundance Square, where a new development centered on a public plaza breaks ground this month. The plaza will be the primary public outdoor gathering space in downtown Fort Worth and one of the most significant public outdoor gathering spaces in the entire region. The design of this space addresses and expresses the shared cultural values and aspirations of the Fort Worth community and responds to a demand for community space that can host both large events and intimate day-to-day gatherings. Two new buildings with ground-level retail and office space above will bookend this urban centerpiece that will become an amenity, both functionally and aesthetically, for the entire surrounding Sundance Square. Adjacent to this site, the Cassidy Building will not only accommodate the region's high demand for office space and urban apartment living, but will feature a retail streetscape on three streets to serve the neighborhood that also includes Sanger Lofts, Sundance West, the Chase Bank Building and other popular Sundance Square destinations designed by DMSAS.



Equally pedestrian-oriented retail experiences can be found in Southlake Town Square in a rapidly growing part of north-central Texas. Our Master Plan from the 1990s sought to foster both a sense of community and a vibrant Main Street experience — an inviting place for pedestrians that was still easily accessible by car. Based on timeless planning principles that could nonetheless accommodate dynamic growth, DMSAS fashioned a roadmap for change that today boasts 555,000 square feet of retail and restaurant use, 26,000 square feet of office space, 250 hotel rooms, and Southlake's first completed phase of single-family residential — all modeled on the modified grid plan of the traditional American "Main Street." Southlake continues to prosper and DMSAS is

currently working on the planning and design of future phases.

Not far away, in Garland, Texas, the open environment of Firewheel Town Center reflects evolving attitudes about retail complexes with a pedestrian-sensitive design in a suburban setting. This 775,000 square foot town center created an important new focal point for development within the City of Garland and the northeast region of the Dallas-Fort Worth metropolitan area. Firewheel's generous awnings and shaded promenades invite the walking shopper to stroll through an experience that pays tribute to the rich and varied architectural styles of the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

In Las Vegas, where the car – along with chance – is king, a similar challenge has been met to bring new

pedestrian life to the Strip with a new kind of oasis for this desert city. Across from Caesars Palace, David M. Schwarz Architects has designed a new street of retail, dining and entertainment venues anchored by a 550' diameter observation wheel. Evocative of a warehouse district that has been treated to adaptive re-use, the street's mythology reaches back the founding days of Las Vegas — the pre-automobile days when two- and three-story buildings sprang up around a train stop. Site work for the project is currently underway, with the May 1 implosion of O'Sheas Parking Garage serving as the latest milestone in the construction process.



Finally, we're delighted to be planning the retail portion of a premier transit-oriented community in the metropolitan Washington, D.C., neighborhood of Gaithersburg, Maryland. On one of the last remaining large developable parcels in Montgomery County, the 320,000 square foot Crown Farm will draw on influences from a traditional American downtown. The first phase, known as Downtown Crown, will be designed to knit together a network of pedestrian-sensitive streets, parks, and public spaces with a commercial centerpiece fashioned in timeless building materials and varied building heights. Our work begins to take shape in construction later this year.

DMSAS Awarded City Center Project in Alpharetta DMSAS, teamed with Atlantabased Smallwood Reynolds



The Smith Center for the Performing Arts officially opened Saturday, March 10, 2012. The Gala opening, produced by George and Michael Stevens (of Kennedy Center Honors fame), is scheduled to air on PBS as a 2-hour special this coming Summer or early Fall. Several DMSAS design team members attended the Hard Hat Concert, headlined by country singer Randy Travis, the previous weekend, and enjoyed seeing the completed building in action and full of guests.

The opening night gala featured Bela Fleck who noted that "if [The Smith Center] is anything like Schermerhorn, you guys are going to love it. It has improved the quality of life in Nashville."

Open only a few months, The Smith Center is already garnering raves from critics and performers alike. In April, the world-renowned Cleveland Orchestra played at The Smith Center and Gary Hanson, the Orchestra's Executive Director, noted that "overall, I think it's [DMSAS's] best concert hall yet. The acoustics are terrific. Franz [Welser-Möst] and I both feel it's the best new hall in the country in a long, long time."

The Smith Center Campus, consisting of Reynolds Hall, the Boman Pavilion, Symphony Park, the Discovery Children's Museum, and a shared outdoor courtyard, is now open to the people of Las Vegas. Considered a model for Public-Private ventures, The Smith Center project demonstrates what a determined group of residents can achieve for their community and the arts. For your next trip to Las Vegas, you can now enjoy sometime off The Strip for performance at one of The Smith Center's venues. If you can't make it to a show, the building's public spaces can also be toured during the day.

Designed for LEED Silver certification, the project is currently going through the public approvals process prior to a formal PUD submission later this year.

New Tarrant County Jail Opens in May

A new 200,000 SF, five-story jail designed by DMSAS will open this month in downtown Fort Worth. The facility provides needed expansion space for the existing highrise jail across the street. The new jail connects to the existing facility via both skybridge and underground tunnel and will accommodate high security detention units for both male and female inmates. The building, which marks the western edge of the precinct of County facilities, is designed for LEED Certification.
