



## CELEBRATING 25 YEARS IN FORT WORTH

On November 1, DMSAS joined our clients, Sundance Square, and city officials in downtown Fort Worth, Texas for the grand opening of Sundance Square Plaza. The completion of the plaza and the adjacent DMSAS-designed Westbrook and Commerce buildings also marked a major milestone in a 25 year collaboration that has contributed to the renaissance of downtown. DMSAS first started working with Sundance Square and the Bass family on a development planning study for downtown in the early 1980's. The 55,000 square-foot Sundance Square Plaza, designed in partnership with Michael Vergason Landscape Architects, is a vibrant, engaging space that will become the living room for the citizens of Fort Worth. It is designed to host a huge variety of events while meeting the everyday needs of workers, residents, and tourists. The plaza features a permanent, multi-purpose stage that can be configured for large and small concerts or movies. Beautiful, decorative water fountains showcase everchanging waterfalls and cascades. Four giant umbrellas covering more than 6,400 feet provide shade by day and a gorgeous light display at night.

The Westbrook and The Commerce Buildings serve as architectural bookends that define the plaza. The Westbrook presents ground floor retail with five floors of office above. Influenced by adjacent historic buildings, it becomes a celebrated backdrop for the built-in stage of the plaza, culminating in a clock tower. The Commerce Building's five stories host over 200 feet of restaurant and retail frontage spilling out into the plaza. Its massing and different facades respond to the height and scale of existing adjacent buildings along each street.



## THE GINGERTOWN WORLD GAMES

For the 2013 edition of our annual charity event, Gingertown, DMSAS designed a winter sports village inspired by Olympic villages and World's Fair grounds. Gingertown builds were again hosted in Washington, DC, Dallas and Nashville, with all three cities holding their build outs during the first week of December.

This year, the DC build instituted an awards program to recognize the best creations. Awards were given in seven categories to the following lots:

- Most Innovative Use of Materials Peeps Arena by Page Southerland Page
- Best Expression of Theme Cinnaplex (Atlas) Theatre by KCCT
- Best Overal Design Quality McDots by Bowie Gridley Architects
- Judges' Choice Mounds Ski Run and Half Pipe by ZGF Architects
- Mayor's Award Warheads Counterterrorism Center by Pennoni Associates
- People's Choice The Coliseum by Walter P. Moore



Once again, all of the structures and 100% of the funds raised by the DC build were donated to local community support organizations, including So Others Might Eat, St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Children's National Medical Center, The Washington Home, The Wendt Center, Deanwood Rehab and Wellness Center and Martha's Table.


In September, for the annual **Design DC** conference, we participated in three sessions. **Principal Craig Williams** presented his lecture, "**Acoustics 101**", aimed at teaching the design community basic principles of acoustics. (For more on acoustics, you can read Craig's corresponding blog post <a href="https://example.com/here">here</a>.) **Associate Ramsay Fairburn** spoke about plurality in the aesthetics of sustainable design in the presentation "**How can THAT Building be Sustainable?**" And **Associate Steve Knight** participated in a panel about traditional design at all scales, from small residential to large civic projects. Steve and DMSAS represented the larger projects, presenting some of our performing arts and civic projects.

During **Architecture Week** in DC this October, **David Schwarz** spoke about Performing Arts Venue Design as part of **AIA|DC's 25 Architects series**. David covered a brief history of the evolution of performing arts design and then spoke in depth about some of the firm's signature arts projects across the US.



Principal Gregory Hoss was invited to lecture at Veronafierre's Designing With Natural Stone Conference in Verona Italy on October 26th. Gregory presented The Smith Center for the Performing Arts, our recently completed project in Las Vegas as a case study, from an architect's point of view, in how natural stone was conceived as part of the project's overall vision, and the process for selecting, fabricating and installing the stone. In addition to attending several days of educational seminars, fabrication facilities and quarries, he toured Marmomacc 2013, the world's largest international fair showcasing stone and all the supporting technologies involved in designing, quarrying, fabricating, and installing stone.

New Work for Vanderbilt Vanderbilt University has commissioned DMSAS to develop a master plan for replacing the university's aging dormitories with residential colleges. We will study conceptual design options for the first three of these residential colleges, each of which will accommodate 300-400 students.



A New Tower Rises at Cook Barely a year after opening more than 500,000 SF of new facilities, Cook Children's Medical Center in Fort Worth, TX is expanding again. In collaboration with our IPD project team partners, DMSAS is currently finishing Detailed Design for a new, six-story, 314,000 SF tower addition. The addition will house a new Medical Lab, Emergency Department, Surgery Suite with 12 operating rooms, Heart Center, and two floors of expansion space for future inpatient beds. The project is being delivered through an Integrated Project Delivery (IPD) method consisting of 11 primary collaborative project team partners. The entire project will cost \$349 Million, including a Utility Plant and Urgent Care Center. Preliminary site work has begun and the new tower is slated to open in 2017.





Knight traveled to Lisbon, Portugal to review stone slab selections and dry lay mock ups for the marble flooring and wainscoting for <a href="The Pennsylvania Building">The Pennsylvania Building</a>, an existing office building on Freedom Plaza for which we are designing interior and exterior renovations.

Also in September, **Principal Gregory Hoss** traveled to **Verona, Italy** to review the Roman Classico Travertine being used in the lobby of <u>The Cassidy</u> in Fort Worth. He looked at several blocks and representative slabs with the goal of selecting travertine with very consistent graining and coloration such that the stone can be bookmatched horizontally across the entire length of the lobby.
