Cow Town Builds a Vibrant, Urban Center Alongoide #s neighborn, Dallas and Adington, the city of Fort Worth represents a part of the largest memopolita area in the seath. With roughly six million residents within an hour of downsown, the design of Fort Worth's city center was in dire need of an update from its industrial, selaring 1990's etyle. One of the most important criteria for the reorganization of Fort Worth was to utilize downtown's potential for nightlife and transform it into a competitive space for retail, drining, and entertainment. Over the course of the last couple decades, David M. Schwarz Architecture and the local government have collaborated to transform downtown Forth Worth from a bully series of parking garages into a warrs, institute public space deserving of the name "Sundance Square." Hopefully, those positive charges will continue to coronize others of what Jeff Speck has already noticed — that "Testus are human after all."


DMSAS Honored with CNU Charter Award for Sundance Square

#### Current DMSAS Intern Architect Mark Elliot and former DMSAS employee Julian Goldman won the Academic Grand Prize at the 2014 CNU Charter Awards for their designs for the rehabilitation of Philadelphia's 30th Street Station completed as part of their coursework at the University of Maryland. Their project reimagines the west bank of the


Schuylkill River in Philadelphia as a vibrant, mixed use neighborhood. The rail yards of historic 30<sup>th</sup> Street Station and riverfront Interstate 76 are built over, mitigating site challenges in a realistic way to repair the urban fabric. A new riverfront esplanade, public square celebrating the train station, and urban park opening to views across the river, give identity to this new district that connects West Philadelphia to Center City.

Juror Will Bruder noted that their proposal "...was the most professionally presented 'un-built' work in the competition...Their plan, in its organization and depth of visual richness, is a standout example of contemporary thinking."

With 212 units, that sets the average unit price around \$920,000. The Woodley sits just off Connecticut Ave, immediately adjacent to the Marriott Wardman Park and a short walk from the Woodley Park Metro.

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#### CHRIS TEIGEN WELCOMES SECOND CHILD


