



GAILLARD CENTER OPENS TO UNANIMOUS ACCLAIM



The Charleston Gaillard Center hosted its first official performance on Sunday, October 18<sup>th</sup>, 2015. The opening Gala was attended by more than 1,800 patrons who filled the newly renovated performance hall. DMSAS project team leaders, President David Schwarz, Principal Craig Williams and Associate Steve Knight (shown above with several other design team members), were in attendance for the opening festivities.

The evening's guests were treated to a breathtaking performance by the Charleston Symphony Orchestra and featured guest performer, world-renowned cellist, Yo-Yo Ma. After gracing the audience with a host of acoustically dynamic arrangements — which highlighted the room's impeccable acoustics — Ma performed Sarabande, from Bach's sixth cello suite. He later said it was a benefaction meant to bless the new hall and those in attendance.

While technically a renovation and expansion of the City's municipal auditorium and exhibit hall, the Gaillard Center is in fact a dramatic reimagining of an existing 1960's- era structure. The Gaillard Center is comprised of an 1,800-seat state-of-the-art, opera-style performance hall, a 30,000 SF conference & banquet facility and over 90,000 SF of municipal offices. The mix of interior uses are linked together by a publicly-accessible galleria promenade. The new limestone trim and stucco clad exterior reflects the rich architectural heritage of Charleston, culminating in raised columned porticos at the two primary entrances. The building is set within reworked landscaping worthy of Charleston's tradition of beautiful public parks and gardens.

Professional photography from Hedrich Blessing is scheduled to be taken in early February, affectionately known around our DC office as 'low country spring'. We can't wait to share that with you when it is completed.




While the staff has been as busy as ever lately, many of them have still made time to take some incredible vacations. Check out what (and where) some of our folks have been up to.
